Amid concerns about Covid-19, Black Lives Matter, the November election, and personal challenges, we must remember those incarcerated at the ICE Aurora Detention Center and those in limbo at DACA. The September 13 Kick-Off meeting features **Keynote Speaker Denise Maes, of ACLU Colorado, speaking about issues facing our undocumented immigrant population**. Her comments will be a powerful exposure of the many injustices against a single group of individuals.



Many who are eventually released from the Aurora Detention Facility turn to Casa de Paz for food, shelter, transportation, and ways to connect with family. Founder and executive director, Sarah Jackson, and over 2,000 volunteers provide hospitality, emotional support, and hope to those leaving detention as well as their loved ones through the arduous process of reunification. Sarah's mission is to help end the isolating experience of immigrant detention one simple act of love at a time. You can follow these activities at www.casadepazcolorado.org.

A Message from Kathy by Boulder AAUW President Kathy Olivier

The 19th Amendment didn't give ALL women the right to vote.

The appointment of Kamala Harris, the first woman of color to run on a major party's presidential ticket, is a "breakthrough in the struggle for equality first demanded more than a century ago by the Suffragists fighting for the 19th Amendment," reports Rehema Ellis of NBC News. "But the amendment didn't give all women the right to vote, which is why we call



this a commemoration, not a celebration. Black women had to continue their fight until the 1965 Voting Rights Act, and that fight is still not over. In certain communities, voter suppression is real – it just looks different in 2020 than it did 50 or 100 years ago. The right of Black women to participate in Democracy has involved struggle every step of the way. But given the opportunity, Black women show up at the polls in higher numbers than other voting blocs."

Voting is a fundamental American right, yet exercising that right is not always easy. Certain jurisdictions attempt to restrict voting under the guise of preventing "voter fraud," even though that is an extremely rare occurrence. Rather than restrict voting, we need to prioritize expanding options for casting a ballot, particularly as the pandemic threatens to hinder some voters' ability to turn out at the polls on a single day. Early voting, voting by mail and no-excuse absentee voting should all be offered as options, in addition to in-person voting on November 3 with appropriate public health safety precautions.

Please join us on September 13th on Zoom for our Annual Fall Kickoff meeting to hear Denise Maes, the Public Policy Director of the ACLU of Colorado. We will introduce our three scholarship recipients and PhD students -Lianne Brito, Tara Ippolito, and Paige Massey (see below). We will also approve our annual budget (see page 6), learn about our goals for the year (see page 5), and meet our officers (see page 5).

Please check that all your information AND your family's information is current. If you have a valid Colorado Driver's License or Colorado Identification Card, you can register to vote or update your voter record at WWW.GOVOTECOLORADO.COM by following the instructions on that page.

IF YOU ARE A NEW COLORADO VOTER, or are unable to register online, complete the paper voter registration form (PDF) and mail it to your County Clerk and Recorder.
